The Insect Enemies

While mankind strives to achieve peace with his worst enemy— itself— war against the second worst enemy goes on as implicitly as it has for 10,000 years since men changed from being hunters to planters.

That enemy is the insect, whose annual toll of crops and livestock mounts into the many hundreds of millions of dollars.

Never before, however, have men had an array of weapons at their disposal such as they now have or hope soon to have— weapons so promising that the U. S. Agriculture Department proposes total warfare against the 100 worst insects that cause 90 per cent of the damage.

High priority insects include the boll weevil, tobacco hornworm and budworm, corn earworm, European corn borer, tropical fruit flies and cattle grub.

Training

It would not be complete eradication but "total population control" (TPC), says entomologist Dr. Ed Knippling, head of insect research for U.S.D.A.

As reported in "The Furrow," magazine of the Insect Depts. Company, TPC means switching of life force to offense—reducing the entire population of an insect in an area and then stamping on it.

Chemicals are essential in the beginning, especially when farmers co-operate in mass spraying campaigns. Better and safer chemicals are constantly being developed.

But the trouble with chemicals is that the more they are used the less efficient they become. It costs as much to kill the last one per cent of a population as it does to kill the first 99 per cent.

Thus other methods being investigated for the stamping job include cultivation practices, natural predators, parasites, diseases, breeding of genetically weaker strains, bait lures and trapping.

For the pink bollworm, which threatens California cotton, scientists are studying a combination of sterilization and a new synthetic sex lure.

At U.S.D.A.'s research center in Beltsville, Md., it has been discovered that jupivabone, a substance in the wood of balsam fir, prevents insects from developing into adults. Scientists are now trying to determine if the compound can be cheaply produced as another nonpoisonous weapon.

The war against the insect goes on. It will never end, but now there is hope that someday the battles will all be one-sided in favor of man.

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To fulfill this need, Pony League fielded 120 boys in its inaugural year in 1966. Because of the lack of facilities, a portion of the games were played on the Junior high school grounds, which proved inadequate, due to poor grounds, lack of bleachers, rest rooms and dugout facilities.

It was agreed that of the 10.2 acre Terrace Park, 14 acres could be used to build a ball field, leaving 14 acres for other ball field parking and other activities. It is not the intent of the Pony League to deprive citizens of their recreational desires, but to be able to share in and contribute to the overall needs of the community.

Labor and materials for the ball field are to be provided by Pony League, which will be provided by donation of money raising projects, and in no way is being funded by the GVRI or other public agencies. It is the intent of the Pony League to provide a ball field for the community and not exclusively for Pony League.

There were 110 votes in Terrace Park, only 12 of which were necessary to remove in the area of the ball park. The ball field will be similar in construction and upon completion, will be surrounded by ball fields, shrubs and other appropriate landscaping to enhance the appearance which will provide rest rooms and other facilities as needed by the community. Pony League which will remain open the year round to accommodate all visitors of Terrace Park.

In past experience there has been 18 to 12 cars in need of parking facilities at a ball field. This is a need which must be created a parking problem. Pony League would immediately provide a parking lot for the community. A dedicated street that runs through the center of the entire length of the park, or with other street parking facilities.

In summation, the day of sandlot baseball is history, and Vallejo Pony League is dedicated to provide 124 year olds a place in the community to throw baseballs instead of rocks, and, in our opinion, the demands of approximately 100 residents do not constitute a mandate when the GVRI is obligated to serve the entire Greater Vallejo Area.
